DISCOVER DOGS 2023

I have taken over the task of organising the Golden Retriever Discover Dogs stand from Ingrid Pinfield who has devoted her time to leading the team for many years. I've been assisting her for over 15 years so agreed to take over the role.

As we had a new team involved with running the stand this year, we thought that a new look would be a good idea too. With this in mind, we decided to have a few hanging banners designed for us. Lynn Kipps of Kipps Photography was approached to supply us with the photographs, but instead she offered to design the entire project, with fabulous results!

Filling the rota for volunteers to man the stand proved relatively easy, approaching a number of people at our Breed Championship Show in December. We also have a list of regular Golden Retriever owners, who represent several interests involving the dog world & who give their time so willingly year after year.

The whole four days at Crufts went very well. The public, as always, have a huge number of varied questions to ask and we are extremely lucky to have such a knowledgeable team of volunteers with a wealth of experience of the breed. The dogs on the stand each day, also enjoyed all the attention





MY EXERIENCE OF TREATING A HAEMATOMA WITH LEECHES By Tracey Kinchella

Instructions come with leeches but here is an overview of our method. <u>https://www.biopharm-leeches.com/.../AURAL_HAEMATOMA_KIT</u>

We ordered 3 leeches and used them 1 week apart.

Bottled water is needed for leech arrival and after leeches have fed plus change water every 10 days. I think this is probably a 2 person job.

Once you are ready then make sure the leeches are at room temperature. This was about 1 hour for us.
 We laid our dog on her side. Make sure you have enough room around you and you are sitting in a comfortable position as it took about 20 mins.

I washed the inside of the ear thoroughly with warm water and a flannel.

3. I used a new razor and shaved the hair from the inside of the ear just on the haematoma.

Note: The leech will not attach if the inside of the ear is not smooth, for our second attempt I did not shave the inside of the ear as I thought the hair was short enough but the leech would not attach.

4. For our first leech attachment I managed to prick the inside of the ear, the second time I scratched the ear with a pin and the third time we didn't do anything. With each method the leech attached however if you want the leech to attach to a specific area I suggest pricking the area and drawing some blood.

5. Phil used the gloves provided for the first time but for the second and third time he used marigolds. Note: We did try surgical gloves for the second time but this didn't work as the leech kept trying to attach to the surgical glove on several attempts.

6. It can be difficult grabbing the leech with the tweezers but once you grab it firmly, place on the inside of the ear. Phil cupped his hand around the leech / haematoma area and used the tweezers / finger to keep the leech in the right area.

Note: It can be difficult to know which is the sucker foot and the head so Phil positioned both ends on the haematoma in a u shape.

We did try covering the leech with a new plastic medicine cup but the leech would not attached to the ear and kept trying to go up the sides of the cup.

6a. At this point I was feeding soft treats to keep our dogs attention.

Note: Watch out for head shaking. At one point the leech had not attached and flew off our dog's ear only to land on my leg.

Just monitor the leech, minimise dog head shaking, keep your dog as relaxed as possible by feeding soft treats, use a calm soothing voice and stroking.

The process took about 20 minutes. Leave the ear to bleed.

Note: On our first attempt I dabbed the blood but this stopped the bleeding so on the second and third attempt I let it bleed and washed the blood off later.

7. Put the fed leech into clean bottled water and a new container and followed as instructions on leech maintenance.

8. One week later we started with a new leech. It took 2 weeks to completely drain









- Your dog tries to defaecate unsuccessfully
- Your dog adopts the 'Sphinx' position
- Your dog's tummy goes hard and / or swells up like a balloon and is as taut as drumskin
- Your dog is trying to bite, or worry, the abdomen
- Your dog is very unsettled

CONTACT YOUR VET IMMEDIATELY. Bloat is a true emergency - be prepared to drive to the surgery straightaway. The chance of survival decreases alarmingly if you delay getting the dog to the surgery more than 60-90 minutes after the first signs.

> So whether you're about to catch a plane, serve a meal or go to bed - DON'T. Take your dog to the vet.

It could save your dog's life.

Rescue





Taking on the mantle of the temporary Rescue officer was an interesting task and certainly not for the faint hearted.

We have a number of potential adoptees waiting in the wings for any dogs needing homes, of which we've had a few. The issues we have at the moment are the adoptees far outweigh the Dogs we have waiting for homes.

I've managed to find loving homes for 3 dogs who needed rehoming due to family issues, divorce, death and illness. By leaving the dogs in their homes and putting them in touch with the potential new owners it gives them the opportunity to get to know each other first and to ask any relevant questions they need answers to.

This has been very successful and the transition of the dog to their new homes has gone smoothly and all the dogs now have loving new homes and have settled really well. The dogs have not been placed in kennels at great expense, so the club will not be held responsible if things go wrong as the contract is between the two parties. I've offered home checks in all instances but none have been taken up.

I suspect the number of dogs not coming available is because of Covid and panic buying from people desperate for a dog during lockdown, and now that reality has hit it's becoming more expensive to go away on holiday because of kennelling, vets fees have soared, back to work where the dog is being left alone. These owners have paid out ridiculous amounts at lockdown prices for puppies and are desperate to recoup their money so instead of using rescue they are selling them on the various dubious websites. This is all too common I'm afraid and perfectly legal and a sad fact of our times.

My role as Rescue officer has now come to an end and Gail Staniland has now kindly stepped into the role, I shall of course offer assistance and advice going forward where I can.

The sun was shining over a dew covered field and slowly cars appeared on to the ground full of eager handlers and excited dogs. The day started with a nice cup of tea because some of the handlers had travelled a long distance, then everyone sat in a semi-circle and the day start with a relaxed atmosphere.

First we chatted about shoot days and the role of Golden Retrievers as part of a picking up team, their job was to retrieve dead and wounded game. Then we moved on to discuss field trials and working tests which encouraged a lot of questions and answers, which then got people chatting. We had a short break and I was encouraged to her people chatting about what we had talked about.

Then the handlers were split into groups of abilities. David Godding took the more advanced group, Lucy Mixture and Chris Marchant took the less experienced group and my group was novices. We then split into different areas of the venue and the learning started.

We began right from the start, everything from the "hold it" command to the stop whistle and everything in between. Everyone had a chance to practice different training techniques and advice was given on how to put right what had gone wrong....with light hearted banter!

Then we stopped for lunch and afterwards the groups continued with their learning. Around 3pm we then stopped the learning and the group watched a demonstration by fully trained Goldens, who beautiful showed off their skills and after the demonstration finished the group clapped with admiration.

From listening to the chatter we had enthused the group to continue with their training and those who were novice, to start their training journey. At this point I was very pleased that we had achieved what we set out to do, and that was to encourage people to work their Goldens.

Personally, I would like to thank the land owner, Laurence Dewis and my amazing trainers. If there is enough interest, Midland Golden Retriever Club are planning more training through the Summer...and hopefully work towards the Goldens and handlers achieving their Working Gundog Certificate, and if achieved we will then look to put on a Show Working Gundog Certificate.

KENNEL CLUB GOOD CITIZEN SCHEME

I suddenly lost my beautiful Grace in November 2020. Her daughter Rosie was grieving and depressed. Parsnip arrived to help both Rosie & I recover - she was 12 weeks old. As with so many pups born in Covid 2020 she was shy & lacked confidence, nervous of other dogs. Rosie became her Mum and taught her how to play and have fun. Over the next few months Parsnip became a new happy dog. Keen to please, basic training was easy - she walked to heel off lead and her recall was excellent - she didn't want to go far.

Rosie had puppies at the end of April 2021 and Parsnip was keen to help - perhaps a little too keen! It was time to start formal training. In May she joined the class attended by my friend's golden Bertie, at the Golden Valley Dog Training Club. The other dogs had already taken the Bronze test, but the trainer was happy that Parsnip would soon be able to keep up. Training with dogs who were preparing for their Silver award meant she really had to focus. In July 2021 Parsnip passed her Bronze test.

And then there was Timmy!

I kept Timmy from Rosie's litter and he became Parsnip's partner in crime. Parsnip relived her puppy days with Timmy and they haven't stopped playing. Her confidence grew and grew - training became more of a challenge!

Training for the Silver award began. The 2 minute down and stay was practised at the end of our daily walk when Parsnip was tired. Some of the dogs in her class were now preparing for their Gold award so she was always pushed. In May 2022 she passed her Silver test and incredibly so did Timmy!! It involved a lot of hard work from all of us, and a lot of tit bits.

The exercises for the Gold award were demanding. The Goldens mastered the 'relaxed settle' exercise quite quickly – they naturally spent the 2 minutes relaxing rather than stressing. The 'stop the dog' and 'send the dog to bed' exercises took time to learn. It involved calling the dog towards you and shouting Stop or Wait when they were half way to you. Again it was learnt by throwing a reward at the same time as shouting Stop Having her bed in the kitchen helped with the 'send the dog to bed' so we could practice whenever I wanted. 'STOP' was added to our walk! Usually at the end when they weren't off chasing pheasants.

The Gold test scheduled for Autumn was postponed as the examiner was unwell. It was then cancelled in November due to poor weather and again in December. The delays gave Parsnip more time to practice. We went back to basics with the off lead heel and leaving a treat. On the day of the test I was still worried about the 'send the dog to bed'. It was difficult to get her to settle down and stay.

She finally took the test in March 2023 & passed. I was thrilled and so proud of her. She'd been mated 9 days before the test and had only just finished her season so I wasn't sure whether she would be able to concentrate - she didn't let me down.

We're lucky to have found the GVDTC & Sue the trainer. I don't think Parsnip considers her obedience classes to be training. All the dogs are excited when they arrive at the training ground. They play in the field before each class - the lessons are just fun for them. Although Parsnip has passed all the Kennel Club Good Citizens awards you wouldn't sometimes know - especially when she's playing with Timmy! So we'll continue going to training - the trainer is already devising new challenges for the class.
